Collage & Mixed Media Class "Fuels the Creative" in Its Participants

Over the course of the semester, the students in Collage & Mixed Media taught by Carmelle Zserdin, BVM were heard to be excitedly discussing the latest challenge given them. Some of this excitement centered on the tea bag challenge, the creation assignment and an introduction to Wabi-Sabi, a Japanese art form. I asked members of the class to explain what the class was for them and how it made them feel. Here are some comments from the students...

-Collage is all about play and feeding my spirit. It is one way I take part in creation. I love to make something that has never been seen before. The process is most often more satisfying than the end-result. In collage, we gather bits and bobs, ephemera, words, numbers, scraps, trash, etc. and see what happens when we follow Carmelle's golden rule which is, "there are no rules."

-I see things differently since being in the class. "Junk" now looks like possible art material. In our latest Wabi Sabi assignment we learned to see the beauty in impermanence and decay...and I truly do see fallen leaves, broken seashells, old barns or broken down fences as beautiful.

-I am a minimal sheet metal sculptor creating most pieces in one piece and one color! Imagine the mind/thought expanding collage class-, forming by build-up of small pieces of color, image with texture and text is a whole new language. I am challenged to speak in a new collage voice!

-Each Monday we are introduced to an assignment to work on the following week. Recently it was blackout poetry. I'm excited to rip some pages out of a book and start looking for words to create my little poem. I always feel so enthused and ready to sit at my dining room table and create and let my household chores just slide.

Many participants also mentioned the creative energy sparked by "generous and talented classmates" and being grateful for this unique RKC offering.
