A Reflection on Last Year's Network Meeting

Have you ever exited an event thinking, "That was interesting," and then two weeks later, had a eureka moment when you realized what you had actually experienced at the event?

That happened to me after the 2017 BVM Women's Network meeting that brought women of three different faiths together to discuss their similarities and differences. One of my initial observations was that we had spent a day together in discussion without raising our voices or trying to change minds, customs, or beliefs. Is that a special gift that women have? To share ideas without demanding conformity or conversion?

A few weeks later, during Schola choir practice at Mount Carmel, I made the connection. The world and its people could solve many of our problems if we behaved more like a choir.

Sometimes music calls for a soloist who sings beautifully alone. The single voice rises up for the enjoyment of all. It is complete and pure by itself. Then a second voice joins the first and they sing together, in harmony. Singing the same words, but not the same notes. The two are supportive of each other, balancing and making the whole richer. Soon another voice picks up the descant, adding more beauty, strength, and variety—all blending. Sometimes one voice will be featured and others will take

the background. Then they switch. It is glorious.

As marvelous as the individual voices are, however, they only achieve that unified quality if the singers listen to each other and understand what their personal role is in creating the masterpiece. It helps to have a director guiding the process.

The question in some situations is "Can I be more

helpful to the group as a singer or a director?"

If we share, listen, and learn from each other, we can make beautiful music together.

Damien House: Through the Eyes of an Associate and Her Grandson

Recently, I had the privilege of representing Damien House and Annie Credidio, BVM on Mission Sunday at St. Lawrence Parish in Santa Clara, Calif. I was first introduced to Damien House, a home and refuge for persons afflicted with Hansen's Disease (leprosy), and Annie on a BVM-sponsored mission trip to Guayaquil, Ecuador. In sharing this beautiful story of faith, hope, and transformation, I recalled my own visits to Damien House and related stories from my 16-year-old grandson's recent mission trip there.

Damien House is just as Annie describes it: as visitors enter this haven, they find beautiful gardens, colorful murals painted on the walls, immaculately clean conditions, and the welcoming spirit of the residents. Justino, a double amputee, whips around in his wheelchair and greets everyone with open arms, a big smile, and his contagious laugh. Justino tells the story of what it was like when the government owned the property—with rats crawling in through broken sewers, no mosquito nets, and even roaches in the residents' meager food. It's not anything like that today.

Carlos is another resident; he was diagnosed with Hansen's disease when he was seven years old. Instead of treating him with the multiple drug therapy that would have cured his disease within nine months, his mother took him to a witch doctor for healing. At 17, the bones in his foot were disintegrating, resulting in the amputation of his leg. His mother then abandoned him, and Carlos went into a deep depression. When he found Damien House, the other patients surrounded Carlos with love and welcomed him into the family. One patient, a carpenter, taught Carlos how to work with wood, and today Carlos makes beautiful crosses. As he etches out the designs, he truly identifies with the suffering wounds of Christ. Carlos, like the other residents, has a deep faith and trust in God. They believe that God will provide.

On their visit to Damien House, my grandson, Brendan, and six other boys from St. Matthias and St. Pius parishes in Redwood City, Calif., were asked to take down screens, wash windows, and put the screens back up. None of them had ever done that kind of work, but they caught on quickly. At first, Brendan thought the job was tedious and boring, but then he realized that he was working to help all the wonderful people he had met at Damien House and the job became a pleasure. Brendan learned the joy of service to others. Now Brendan is "hooked" on Damien House and is looking forward to returning, just like his grandma!
