Dear Circle of Friends,

BVMs and associates have pondered the significance of the stoles that are presented and worn as a part of associate commitment ceremonies.

The stoles have been a part of the ceremonies since 1993. These hand-woven pieces of cloth were a symbol of the call to BVM ministry world-wide and were worn around the shoulders to remind us that *1 Peter 2:9* calls us to be "priestly" people, i.e. "those who can risk coming close to God" (*Christian Community Bible*). The stoles came from BVM

ministries in Quito, Guatemala, and (most recently) Ghana. However, in response to concerns over the years, and after much discussion, the Associate Coordinating Committee and the Associate Coordinator Team have decided that stoles will be used during the commitment ceremony to surround the candle, the associate pin, and personal

Therese was widowed in 2015. She met her late husband during her time studying nursing at St. Xavier College in Chicago. The two raised a daughter and son together in Darien, III. Today, Therese enjoys spending time with her four grandchildren and three greatgranddaughters; she also loves reading, going to movies, and playing card and board games.

Space for Spiritual Silence

Many sacred silences take place at Mount Carmel in Dubuque, Iowa. Some are individual, some are congregational, while others are created in small groups. One regularly scheduled silence is hosted by a prayer group that has met together since 2002. They faithfully gather on the first Monday of each month, in a thirdfloor turret of the Caritas Center.

"Over the years the style has changed," shares Donard Collins, BVM. "At the very beginning, we didn't have as much sharing. Now we are doing a *Lectio Divina*, and share a word or phrase. Then we look at a different translation, read it aloud again, and see what words would stick out. After we have shared, we move to contemplative prayer for the remainder of our time together."

Participants share the scripture selection process and reading duties. They meet for an hour, sharing stories, texts, intercessory prayers, and silence. After the time of silence, members spend time in unity building over a shared meal, where they often expand on an inspiration gained in the silence. Members have come and gone from the group for various reasons (as is the natural order of all groups). The group is made up of an equal number of sisters and associates. BVMs C. Jean Hayen and Mary Angela Buser and Associates Marilyn Wasmundt and Mary Chapman are the remaining founding members. They have been joined by others: BVMs Donard Collins and Elizabeth Olsen, and Associates Holly Bernhardt and Christine Olsem.

When asked, many of these members share they treasure this monthly gathering; it's uplifting.

"I look forward to this group," adds Christine. "It gives me such peace, and it is unlike any other time in the month."

Christine joined the group in 2014, soon after becoming an associate. For her, "It is easier to spend time in quiet prayer when in a circle of friends than when at home alone, surrounded by distractions."

Finding a sacred silence has been a joy for this circle. Consider reaching out to your prayer partner and be silent together soon.
